When you're on a quest for a truly unique nature photography adventure, China is calling. You'll come home with rare images of wildlife and landscapes few travelers are privileged to see. In secluded nature reserves and national parks deep within the Minshan Mountains of Sichuan, great rivers and gorges dissect lush forests sheltering some of the world's most endangered creatures. This is the last wild habitat of the giant panda, which subsists on the bamboo protected in these sanctuaries. Supported by WWF, these little-visited wilderness enclaves also harbor rare moon bears, golden snub-nosed monkeys, shaggy takin, Chinese goral, blue sheep and exquisite birds, including the golden pheasant. Developed with our own Photo Expedition Leaders and local Chinese guides, our singular itinerary reveals Chinese nature at its most entrancing—plus cultural highlights like traditional Tibetan villages and the Terracotta Army in the ancient city of Xi'an. We also include close-up panda photography at China's renowned research and breeding bases.

Day 1: Xi'an, China — Ancient City Wall

Arrive in the ancient imperial capital of Xi'an, one of China's earliest regions to be settled, and transfer to our hotel in the Yanta District where we find a number of iconic cultural sites including the Wild Goose Pagodas. Xi'an is where China's first emperor united the disparate warring tribes of the vast realm in the 3rd century B.C. to launch one of the world's most extraordinary civilizations. The capital of 13 dynasties, Xi'an's walled city and narrow streets hark back to a time when it was a center for cultural, religious and economic interactions between East and West at the east end of the Silk Road traveled by Persian and Arab traders 1,300 years ago.



After lunch, we visit a portion of the ancient city wall. Xi'an is one of the few cities in China where the old city walls still stand, with most sections carefully restored or rebuilt. Constructed originally in 1370 during the Ming dynasty, the imposing 40-foot-high walls are surrounded by a dry moat and form a rectangle with an 8.6-mile perimeter. Atop the city walls, photograph the old city within its confines, and get panoramic shots over modern-day Xi'an beyond. This evening, gather for a delectable Chinese meal at our welcome dinner.

Day 2: Xi'an—Terracotta Army / Lesser Wild Goose Pagoda

Depart early this morning to photograph Xi'an's most famous sight, the Terracotta Warriors. Unearthed in 1974 in the suburbs outside the walled city, the stone army is one of the world's most remarkable archaeological discoveries. Consisting of 8,000 life-size soldiers, 130 chariots and more than 500 horses, none identical, the army was built to guard the massive mausoleum complex of Qin Shihuang (259–210 B.C.), the pivotal leader who became China's first emperor. The figures vary in height according to their rank, the tallest being the generals. The majority of the figures remain in situ in the pits near the mausoleum, while other non-military terracotta figures were found in adjoining pits, including officials, acrobats, strongmen, and musicians. The Terracotta Army was discovered by a group of local farmers who were digging a well near the Qin Emperor's tomb mound in a region laced with underground springs. Subsequent excavation and research via ground-penetrating radar has revealed that the Army is part of a much larger necropolis covering 38 square miles, part of the emperor's imperial palace compound surrounding his tomb.

We continue on to Lesser Wild Goose Pagoda, the smaller of two impressive towers built in Xi'an in the 8th century during the Tang dynasty. The site was inscribed on UNESCO's World Heritage List in 2014 as part of the Silk Roads Network. The well-preserved Buddhist temple is surrounded by a tranquil park and gardens, which we wander through before returning to our hotel. After dinner, we head out to discover Xi'an after dark, capturing photos of the cityscape lit up at night.

Day 3: Wild Panda Nature Reserve

This morning, board the bullet train to Guangyuan, where we meet our bus and drive to the Wild Panda Nature Reserve. Along the way, we stop in the Muslim village of Qing Xi, with time to photograph scenes of relaxed street life amid the 300-year-old wooden buildings that date from the Qing dynasty. It's a peaceful setting, with a stream coursing through the center of the village. Just beyond lies a secret slice of Chinese wilderness, a chain of nature reserves little known to outsiders and visited by a mere handful of Westerners. As we follow a rushing river up the narrow valley to our destination, keep an eye out for native wildlife, which we stop to photograph along the way. Eventually we arrive at our hotel, tucked away in the forest in a setting that's virtually unknown to tourists, where our nearest neighbors are mostly wild animals that flourish in these protected environs.





Day 4: Exploring the Wild Panda Nature Reserve with Exclusive Access

Our focus for two days is a remote 100,000-acre sanctuary encompassing a densely forested ecosystem that is among the most diverse and intact in Asia. This national reserve, rated Grade I by WWF as a global biodiversity hotspot, is home to healthy populations of some of the world's most endangered and vulnerable wildlife, including at least 60 giant pandas. Among its 430 different mammal species, the reserve also harbors more than 1,200 takin — a large, shaggy relative of wild sheep and goats — as well as more than 2,400 different plant species. Look for wildlife on morning and evening excursions, stopping to capture stunning photos of waterfalls, boulder-strewn gorges and mist-shrouded limestone peaks. This is prime panda habitat, and although sightings of this famously elusive animal are extremely rare, our exclusive permits allow us into remote areas of the reserve where pandas freely live and breed, affording us the best possible opportunity to spot signs of them in the wild. Even though we almost certainly will not spy them in the heavy bamboo understory, just knowing we're in their midst is exhilarating.

Day 5: Wild Panda Nature Reserve / Pingwu

Spend another day searching for wildlife as we explore more of the reserve's lush recesses. Bring your longest lens as we look for Tibetan and rhesus macaques, golden and Sichuan takin, musk deer, muntjac, serow, wild boar and blue sheep. More rarely, we may also see endangered moon bears and red pandas. Birding is superb, with more than 150 species in the reserve—the elegant golden pheasant is a prize. We can often photograph many of these from the many remote roads and trails we explore, although dense vegetation and weather may affect our sightings. Late this afternoon, we depart the reserve and follow the scenic Fujiang River through the Min Mountains, returning to Qing Xi where we stop for an authentic local dinner. Afterward, we drive a short distance to Pingwu in far northwest Sichuan, our destination for the next two nights.

Day 6: Golden Monkey Nature Reserve

This morning we enter the forested nature reserve home to golden snub-nosed monkeys that live in the shadow of Sichuan's tallest mountain. We walk uphill for about 30 minutes on a trail leading into the nature reserve where the monkeys reside, with rest stops en route. The reserve covers 62 square miles of wild terrain filled with alpine forest, waterfalls, lakes, colorful karst formations, glacial rivers and an abundance of animals. Expect to get excellent close-up photos of endangered golden monkeys, which have been habituated to humans and are unfazed by our presence. The monkeys live in highly social bands, and their interactions delight us. Covered in a mantle of long, shaggy fur, they are hardy creatures, tolerating winter snow and colder temperatures better than any other non-human primate. On our return journey to Pingwu, we drive through territory home to Baima Tibetans, the descendants of Tibetan soldiers sent here more than 1,300 years ago to conquer the frontier. Keep an eye out for hats sporting white rooster feathers worn only by this group of Tibetan women.





Day 7: Dujiangyan

A scenic drive is in store as we make the full-day journey south to Dujiangyan. Traveling through this mountainous region, we pause periodically to photograph dramatic landscapes, rural villages and Buddhist temples. Along the way, we pass through Mianyang, known as Fujun in ancient times, with a 2,200-year history that spans the Qin and Han dynasties. We also visit a local market in Jiangyou that gives us a taste of small-town life and showcases the bounty of fruit and vegetables harvested locally in the Sichuan Basin. Enjoy a traditional dinner this evening, then rest up in Dujiangyan at an elegant new resort hotel.

Day 8: Dujiangyan Panda Base / Dujiangyan Panda Valley

Today provides chances for close-up views of China's beloved giant pandas on a visit to two panda facilities in Dujiangyan. Opened in 2013 with the arrival of 10 pandas, Dujiangyan Panda Base focuses on rescue, disease control and prevention, and rehabilitation of injured and ill wild pandas. It has expanded its mission, and its numbers, to encompass care for senior and disabled pandas as well as healthy pandas that are part of the preventive research program. We dedicate a portion of our time here to volunteer in the care of the pandas, though this opportunity is not guaranteed and depends on the status of the pandas at the time of our visit. Conditions permitting, we enjoy a behind-the-scenes look at caring for pandas and may have the chance to assist their keepers with tasks such as preparing their food.

After lunch, we visit Dujiangyan Panda Valley for more close-up panda shots. This is a newer facility that is both a panda research and breeding base and a center for conservation education. Reintroduction training experts from around the globe gather here for collaborative research. In natural environs, pandas are gradually habituated and returned to the wild, and we may see pandas in transitional "dens" learning to live on their own. We'll see many red pandas here as well.





Day 9: Gengda Wolong Panda Base / Rilong

Setting out from Dujiangyan, our destination is the recently rebuilt Gengda Wolong Panda Center in the Wolong Nature Reserve, a base that integrates scientific research, captive breeding and reintroduction of pandas into the wild. More than 30 pandas reside at the center, which includes a 680-acre bamboo forest. Get close-up photos of giant pandas in this natural habitat that features a striking mountain backdrop.

Continue driving west to Rilong, a Tibetan village well known as a base camp for climbing 20,505-foot Mount Siguniang. Translating to Four Sisters Mountain, this imposing massif encompasses four separate peaks and is often referred to as the "Chinese Alps." In Rilong, we are immersed in Tibetan culture, with traditional architecture on display and yak butter tea for sale by local vendors. This high-altitude village, which sits over 10,000 feet above sea level, is the center of the Jiarong Tibetan culture, found only in this region of Sichuan province. The rural Jiarong people are known for their intricately embroidered costumes and agricultural lifestyle, and we're sure to have plenty of chances to capture their rich cultural heritage in photos.

Day 10: Siguniangshan National Park

Early risers will want to catch a photo of the sunrise behind the peaks in Rilong, a vista of singular beauty. We spend the full day photographing the dramatic scenery of nearby Siguniangshan National Park. Entering the 25-mile-long Shuangqiao Valley, view snowcapped peaks in every direction, with Four Sisters Mountain towering above. The valley floor is 10,000 feet above sea level, and the highest mountains nearly double that. Explore the colorful geological features and mirror-like lakes of this subalpine terrain, following boardwalk trails that weave among intermittent pagodas and prayer flags. Highlights include the Yin-Yang Valley, Willow Bridge, Sun-Moon Mirror Mountain and Five-Colored Mountain with its rocks that glow red, yellow, green, blue and white. These high-altitude forests are native habitat for the endangered red panda. Deeper into the valley, we reach the Ginsenguo flatland, with a viewing deck overlooking highland swamps and snowy peaks, and Jiujia Lake, which is actually a group of four seasonal lakes and nine perennial ones—the legendary bathing pools for the "four sisters." Return to Rilong for the night.





Day 11: Rilong / Labahe Nature Reserve

Depart this morning for Labahe Nature Reserve located southwest of Chengdu in the Hengduan Mountains. En route, we travel through another Jiarong Tibetan region, stopping for photos in Yaoji Tibetan village. At the head of the Baoxing Valley separating the plains of Sichuan from the Tibetan Plateau, we visit Dengchigou Catholic Church where Father Pere Amand David stayed in the mid-19th century, introducing the giant panda to the Western world for the first time. The priest, who was also a natural historian and researcher with the National Museum of France, is credited with finding 68 new bird species, over 100 insect species, and many mammal species including golden monkeys and Milu deer in addition to giant pandas, which he revealed to the wider world in 1869. Once we reach the Labahe reserve, we check in to our hotel, then head out to start exploring the area around it. Labahe Nature Reserve is one of China's premier spots for seeking out the elusive and endearing red panda. At dinner time, we may see water deer coming down to lick salt outside our hotel.

Day 12: Labahe Nature Reserve

A full day is dedicated to searching for wildlife, especially red pandas, in the Labahe reserve. Although giant pandas also live here, we are less likely to see them. Comprised of mixed forests and pockets of dense bamboo, the reserve's diverse vegetation and altitude create ideal habitat for the red panda, which is adapted to environments above 7,000 feet. A wide variety of other mammals and birds thrives here, too, and we look for Tibetan macaque, Chinese leopard cat, hog badger, serow, sambar deer, golden takin, and red and white giant flying squirrels. Notable birds include the golden-breasted fulvetta, Lady Amherst's pheasant, crimson-breasted woodpecker and three-toed parrotbill. In our private vehicle, we have the freedom to explore different parts of the reserve, including opportunities for stunning landscape photography from higher mountain locations.

Day 13: Labahe / Bifengxia Panda Base / Chengdu—Bian Lian "Sichuan Face Changing" Show

Early this morning, depart Labahe to drive to Bifengixa Panda Base, home of the China Conservation and Research Center for the Giant Panda. We'll see plenty of pandas roaming within large enclosures filled with lush vegetation, including their favored food, bamboo. Afterward, take photos at scenic Bifengixa Gorge followed by lunch, before continuing to our hotel at Chengdu's international Tianfu Airport for convenient departures tomorrow.


At this evening's festive farewell dinner, enjoy a demonstration of Bian Lian, or "Sichuan face changing," a mesmerizing opera element where performers rapidly switch colorful masks to portray different characters and emotions. Only about 200 people practice this secretive art form that can entail changing up to 10 masks in less than 20 seconds, and we marvel at the mystery and the mastery as we reflect on the adventures we've shared.





Day 14: Chengdu / Depart

After breakfast at our hotel, transfer to the airport terminal close by to meet departing flights.

- A Rare Opportunity to Search for Wild Giant Pandas We hold exclusive permits to enter a remote, little-visited nature reserve, with access to areas where wild giant pandas live and breed freely. Though their numbers are few in this vast reserve and they are *highly* elusive—we won't expect to see them—it's a thrill to be able to look for them in their native wild habitat.
- A Virtually Unvisited Reserve Offers Exclusive Wildlife Photo Opportunities in addition to wild pandas, the reserve described above is home to many other species including red panda, blue sheep, civet, leopard cat, Tibetan and rhesus macaque, muntjac, serow, moon bear, golden and Sichuan takin, and more than 150 species of birds, including the golden pheasant. Due to a half-century of protection from hunting, they are often visible from roads and trails. However, it is important to note that vegetation is heavy, weather can affect wildlife visibility, sightings are highly unpredictable, and we generally see wildlife at a distance.
- Get Close-Ups of Giant Pandas on Four Separate Panda Bases Visits if it's panda photos you're after, we're certain no other tour offers the panda immersion this one does. We make sure you get all the close-range shots you hope for. On four separate panda base visits, you'll photograph pandas in different settings, from enclosures ensuring good close-ups to natural, open environs where pandas may climb trees or otherwise engage in typical "in the wild" behavior.
- Photograph Golden Monkeys in a Mountain Nature Reserve China's other hallmark species is the golden snub-nosed monkey, and we include a visit to a golden monkey reserve where a large habituated troop provides endless entertainment from just feet away. Though they are not truly "wild," neither are they enclosed, and we are thus able to get wonderful close-ups of their wizened faces and charming behavior.

We spend the entire day photographing the dramatic scenery of Siguniangshan National Park as we traverse the high-altitude Shuangqiao Valley, ringed by snow-capped peaks, including Four Sisters Mountain, rising to 20,000 feet. Colorful geological features, mirror-like lakes, pagodas and prayer flags make for captivating photography subjects. Few if any western travelers regularly set eyes on this stunning landscape. Our Expedition Leader offers guidance along the way to help you get exceptional shots.

6 Photograph Scenes of Traditional Tibetan Culture

Our travels include an overland traverse along the edge of the sprawling Qinghai-Tibet Plateau, where small villages, prayer flags and chortens dot the landscape. We'll learn more about this deeply traditional culture, which offers a dramatic counterpoint to the urban Chinese setting of Chengdu.

Of course, we would not omit the chance to visit this extraordinary archaeological site, where you'll have a chance to get close-up shots from a wide range of angles of the thousands of hand-carved warriors, horses and chariots unearthed here more than 2,000 years after their intricate creation—no two statues are exactly alike!

Physical Requirements

Moderate

In order to participate in this trip, you must be able to walk unassisted (without the use of walking aids) at a steady pace for a minimum of two miles over uneven terrain. While this is the minimum consecutive distance, you must also be prepared for a daily cumulative total of up to five miles per day. On a couple of these active days we will be at altitudes exceeding 10,000 feet above sea level. Our itinerary involves daily walks or hikes of varied lengths over pavement, boardwalks and dirt forest trails that can be muddy, slippery and uneven with roots and rocks (note that all walks can be more difficult to navigate during inclement weather). Some activities involve walking up and down hills, including our visits to the panda bases and the golden monkey nature reserve. Our excursions in the Wild Panda Nature Reserve and Rilong area may require climbing multiple sets of stairs, many without handrails. The trip also involves several walking transfers through crowded train stations, many very early morning starts and long, full days of activities with little down time, all of which can be tiring. Some drives between locations are long (6-7 hours or longer depending on local conditions) and occur on winding roads that are often somewhat rough. During outings, while we will stop at the cleanest and most modern bathroom facilities available, there will often be times when Asian-style squat toilets in basic (and sometimes dirty) local facilities are our only option. Our local assistant will carry a portable toilet seat on legs for those guests who have difficulty squatting.

Important Information About This Trip

Among many travelers, China tends to be known more for its history and culture than its nature. But we focus on the natural treasures most visitors miss, including an in-depth experience with the pandas of Sichuan province and a remote, rarely visited wildlife reserve where wild giant pandas live and breed, as well as a host of other rare animals and birds. Our staff who helped create the itinerary commented: "This itinerary trades time spent in polluted air, traffic, crowds and airports for beautiful, pristine mountain country. But we don't always have 5-star restaurants or services, and English-speaking locals and hotel staff do not exist in many areas. Parts of the trip are more rustic, but the nature rewards are so worth it!"

That said, however, it's important to note that there is a fundamental difference between the wildlife experience in China and what you would experience on a typical African safari, for instance. Terrain here is heavily forested, and while wildlife abounds in natural areas, animals are not always easy to see or photograph. Many are expertly camouflaged or hidden within the vegetation, making them challenging to spot. To date, we have never seen a giant panda in the wild, as they are exceptionally elusive. But rangers have seen them, and we have seen signs of them, including chewed bamboo and scat. Guests should not come to China expecting to see wild pandas, but it is exhilarating nonetheless to know we are in their midst. Weather can also affect wildlife sightings, and when it is inclement, animals may be more likely to take cover in the deep forest. However, our itinerary is carefully designed to capitalize on the very best opportunities to see rare Chinese wildlife, maximizing your chances. Our seasoned Expedition Leaders and local guides are experts at locating wildlife—and we encourage our guests to understand that the privilege of stepping into a wild, untouched world inside China is a reward in itself.

We do have multiple opportunities to see giant pandas up close, though—a highlight of our trip. These encounters occur not in the wild, but at China's panda research bases where the pandas live within a constructed setting that contains or mimics elements of their natural habitat. While the environment is more zoo-like, it provides a rare chance for hours of observing many pandas at close range, a privilege very few people get to enjoy. It's a moving opportunity not available anywhere else but Sichuan.





Mandatory Insurance

Since the areas we travel to on this trip are remote and wild (that's why we go there!), we require medical evacuation insurance for our guests' safety. If you decline the medical evacuation insurance coverage offered by Natural Habitat, we request that you send us documentation of the independent coverage you have selected. We will add the cost of a medical evacuation policy to your tour invoice until you provide our office with proof of coverage including your insurance company's name, contact number and your individual policy number. Thank you for understanding that our policy exists exclusively in the interest of our guests' safety.
